

Animal Husbandry and Dairying was pivotal in overcoming initial challenges.







he Sri Saisrinivasa Joint Liability Group (JLG) from Kambampadu, NTR, Andhra Pradesh, embarked on an exciting journey into dairy farming. With the help of Department of Animal Husbandry & Dairying the group decided to launch their dairy farm, initially purchasing 21 Sahiwal cows. They put in efforts by cultivating 5 acres of land for growing green and dry fodder to ensure a

steady feed supply throughout the year. Focused on branding their dairy products as organic, the JLG farmers have successfully marketed milk and dairy items while promoting organic farming practices. The department played a crucial role by providing guidance, facilitating market access, and offering training on best practices such as hygiene, animal care,





and feed management. Through exposure visits and awareness camps, they learned effective marketing techniques and organic branding strategies. Selling their produce at local GoPushti stalls has significantly boosted their income, with earnings rising by 30-40% in just a year.

Vaishavi's passion for health and lifestyle led her to embrace chemical-free, natural farming. At Shoonya Farms in Greater Noida, she manages over 250 high-pedigree cows from breeds like Gir, Sahiwal, and Tharparkar. Starting an indigenous cow-based

farm in an urban area was a formidable challenge due to the scarcity of indigenous cows and farmers' reluctance to adopt natural methods. Vaishavi overcame these hurdles by collaborating with various FPOs, helping hundreds of farmers improve quality measures and marketing strategies. She also tackled the sandy soil of her farm by using cow manure and





organic solutions to enhance soil fertility, yielding promising results after three years. Vaishavi's perseverance not only improved farmer incomes through reduced costs and better produce quality but also contributed to preserving native cow breeds and combating soil desertification.

Her focus on producing high-quality A2 milk and value-added products like ghee, which

In recognition of her achievements, she was awarded the "Best Livestock Keeper State Award" for FY 2021-22, along with a prize of Rs 20,000. Ms. Patel's success story and innovative techniques have made her a role model for aspiring women.

With no prior experience, Nirupaben participated in training programs and campaigns organized by the department. She learned to incorporate modern technologies such as fans and sprinklers to protect her cattle from heat, and she used balanced feed, and vaccinations to ensure their health.

Her commitment to maintaining high standards





of hygiene and quality paid off. She now successfully operates a farm with 52 animals, including 30 milking cows, selling Gir cow milk for ₹ 70 per liter and buffalo milk for Rs. 80 per liter. Despite the hardships, Nirupaben's journey from homemaker to thriving dairy entrepreneur exemplifies resilience and self-reliance.



With ₹70,875 in financial assistance from the NLM Innovative Poultry Productivity Project, Pi Ramsangzeli launched her small-scale broiler farm. The training sessions, workshops, and farmer tours organized by the department provided her with the knowledge needed to overcome challenges and optimize production. As she began selling her poultry through her





small shop, her income rose significantly. Now, she earns ₹17,000 per month, achieving financial independence and significantly improving her family's well-being.





They informed her about government interest subsidies for setting up a small dairy farm, sparking her decision to enter the dairy sector.

With guidance from the department, Sonalben applied for a loan to establish her dairy unit. Her application for ₹ 2,50,800 was approved, and she received an additional subsidy of ₹ 48,000. With these funds, she purchased 12 milch cows, constructed a shed, and invested in essential equipment like milking machine, fogger system etc. to ensure her animals' well-being and farm hygiene.





Now, Sonalben's dairy operation produces around 90 liters of milk daily, earning her approximately ₹ 90,000 per month with savings of ₹ 40,000. Her successful expansion, increasing daily production to 120 liters, highlights her resilience and entrepreneurial spirit. Sonalben's journey from homemaker to thriving dairy farmer serves as an inspiring example of self-reliance and economic empowerment.





Joint Liability Group (JLG) with four other individuals. Lalithamma with the support of Other members followed the Semi intensive method of feeding of Cattle. Apart from Milk production the members of group also started preparing Panchagavya with the dung and urine of the animals and started cultivating the fodder in 10 acres of land under Natural Farming. This also helped not only the financial position of the members of the group but also created awareness on sustainable agriculture practice. Through all these efforts, they also successfully established an outlet under the brand name "BUGGA MILK."





Lalithamma's journey has been a beacon of inspiration to other farmers and youth in the region. Her success has motivated many to transition to livestock rearing, improving their financial status and showcasing the potential of dedicated agricultural entrepreneurship. opportunity, she applied for a loan through the I-Khedut portal. With the support of the Department of Animal Husbandry & Dairying she got assistance of ₹ 7 Lakhs. With the funds, Sonalben purchased 50 indigenous cows (Gir and Kankrej), set up a new housing facility, and installed essential equipment like a fogger system, milking machine, and electric chaff cutter. Her farm now produces about 170 liters





of milk daily. She sells half to Dairy, earning an annual income of ₹ 600,000-700,000, while the rest is used to make value-added products like ghee and buttermilk for local markets.

Sonalben's success story exemplifies how unwavering belief and strategic actions can lead to remarkable achievements.

Her efforts not only improved goat health but also





boosted profits. She sold 18 quintals of compost and vermi-compost, earning ₹ 5.5 lakhs and made an additional profit of ₹ 2-2.5 lakhs last year. Honored with the IARI-Innovative Farmer Award 2020, Aashma's success with integrated organic farming technology has made her a role model for women entrepreneurs.

The SHG focuses on broiler production and operates a hatchery



Today, her farm boasts of 23 milking cows, 11 heifers, and 13 calves, producing 260-270 liters of milk daily, along with dairy products like yogurt and cheese. With ambitions to expand her herd to 100 cows, Juna's vision for growth is clear.

The Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Department played a crucial role in her success, providing financial aid for growing fodder and connecting her with the Himalaya Dairy Co-operative Society for direct milk sales. They also introduced her to advanced management techniques in housing, feeding, and hygiene, enhancing the efficiency of her operations. Juna's farm also runs a biogas





plant, converting waste into energy for domestic use. Her sustainable practices earned her recognition as an "Outstanding Progressive Dairy Farmer" in 2015, boosting her monthly earnings to ₹70,000 - ₹80,000.

In one year, her hard work paid off, yielding a profit of over ₹ 300,000. She reinvested these earnings, expanding her herd by acquiring ten more




